ART

Report from Miss Anderson, Head of Art A selection of great work from this year

It has been a busy few terms in the art department with some exceptional work produced by our very talented students here at WCSA. Year 11 have now completed their course and we are incredibly proud of the hard work and determination they demonstrated to complete their coursework. Our current GCSE students are working well on their coursework and demonstrating some exciting skills within idea development in their sustained projects.









In Year 7 we have been continuing our exploration of 'Dia De Los Muertos' which is the mexican festival 'The Day of the dead'. Students have been enjoying experimenting with patterns and colour looking at Mexican patterns and contextual references. They have then applied their knowledge into the development of their own clay models of a calavera.











Year 8 have completed their investigation into Pop Art and have moved on to develop their skills investigating the photorealistic style of Joel Penkman within their food topic in cycle 4. This has allowed them to explore the use of both acrylic and watercolour paint. We have thoroughly enjoyed mixing colours and developing accuracy in painting.











In Year 9 the students have built on their idea development skills learnt in cycle 3 through their 'Upfest' exploration and are investigating the theme of current affairs allowing them to develop their own personal response to the theme and explore visual communication further.

Report from Mrs. Burrows, Head of DT

This has been an exciting year with students back in the workshop, designing and making products. Year 7, 8 and 9 students have been introduced to the four different area of design and technology; food, graphics, resistant materials and textiles.

and textiles.



In resistant materials the Year 7 students finished their Trains with a carriage by using a number of workshop skills. The students generated their own design ideas to produce the carriage.



In textiles the students designed and made a tie-dyed cushion cover based on sea life theme using various embellishments.

During the first Graphic Products module Year 7 students are introduced to the design process whilst tackling the subject of mechanisms, manufacture and quality control in a practical exploration into the world of pop up cards and books.

The last Year 7 groups for this year have completed their introduction to food preparation and nutrition and made a variety of dishes.



In textiles students in Year 9 have completed a problem solving and felt work project, where they go onto design and make a colourful fun character and learn how to do blanket stitch, applique and various other embroidery stitches to embellish it.



In resistant materials Year 8 and 9 Woodworking skills are built upon in this project with dovetail joints being cut by hand. The finished product was then decorated using exotic wood veneering techniques

Year 9 Graphic students are given the opportunity to develop their CAD (computer aided design) skills during the 'Branding' module where they design their own logos and t-shirt designs on Photoshop.

In food Year 8 have learnt a new range of skills including making a healthy fruit salad, pizza making, savoury scones and cookies. Year 9 continue to improve their advanced practical skills, making complex dishes such as bolognese, upside-down cake and decorated swiss rolls

In Year 10 resistant materials a variety of practical products were designed/made using basic materials such as softwoods, hardwoods, ferrous metals, non-ferrous metals, alloys, thermo-plastics and thermo-setting plastics.

These included; screwdriver, games holder, children's toys etc...

Woodworking and electronic skills are used to make this lamp which can be used as a mood light or bedside lamp. The students generate their own ideas on 2D design and then engrave them on acrylic using the laser cutter.

In Year 10 students are encouraged to design and make products with creativity and originality while covering the "Paper and Boards" specification, by completing a variety of classwork exercises/exciting mini projects covering video game design, laser cutting, 3d modelling and more. Students develop and channel their graphical and CAD/CAM skills using a range of software, materials and equipment in the classroom and workshops.

During Year 11 our students in resistant materials and graphics have completed a controlled assessment task, based on the material area they have been studying. Graphics students produced some amazing board games with a variety of themes.

Our food students have done an excellent job in producing a dish to meet a final brief as part of their qualification.

We would like to wish all our 2021-22 Design and Technology students successes in their futures.


Report from Mrs. Burlinson, Head of Music





Report from Archie Matthews (Year 10), Head of the CJR

What a year it's been for all the students in CJR - working hard towards a better environment for all!



We have continued to watch our rewilding area as it develops. It is a fantastic habitat for its resident foxes, badgers, hedgehogs and an array of birds and insects. We have a wide variety of plant life, including many different species of fruit trees and herbs. We will gather a lovely crop of apples and pears in autumn to share with the community. The team has worked hard this year to keep this area free of litter, regularly taking out bags of the plastic waste that gets blown in there.

In addition to this, our group has been working on a biodiversity area within the science quad. We have started small with the intention to expand as we develop our expertise. Mr Davies, our Restaurant Manager, has been a great help supplying us with plants ready to go out. We have also been hugely supported by our local community; after Archie reached out via social media we received very generous donations of equipment to build our own planters, gardening tools and massive quantities of seeds. We have built bug hotels to encourage increasing invertebrate life, which can then go on to help feed our birds and other predators.

We have encouraged the school to participate in No Mow May - leaving a border next to each of our fences in which wildlife can flourish, as well as reducing the

frequency of mowing other key areas of the school - the science quad particularly has spent much of the spring and summer covered with a beautiful lawn of daisy and clover - providing vital nectar for our insect population.

Archie, in leading the team, has continued to work closely with the UK Schools Sustainability Network, who were instrumental in taking some of our students to COP26 last year - a growing network of students working together via zoom, and more recently with live meetings around the country, to push their communities to further efforts to improve our biodiversity and drive towards reaching Net Zero as fast as possible. Later in July some of the team are going on a trip to woodlands outside Oxford, to meet and work with other UKSSN enthusiasts, fully funded by Oxford University.

Starting in September, the older CJR members have a fantastic opportunity to get trained as peer coaches - working with the "Dirt is Good" project funded by Percil and Unilever to build their leadership skills by working with younger students in positive social actions that they develop themselves as a team. We are hugely excited to see what this enthusiastic and highly motivated team of students can come up with next.



DUKE OF EDINBURGH

Report from Miss Elliott, Teacher of Science

Eighteen of WCSA's most determined students recently finished the expedition section of the DofE award this June. To embark upon this challenge, WCSA students have conducted training in school and in the Mendips. The Mendips walk in May was a hot sunny weekend full of laughter and a few tears with the heavy bags and self-sufficient discipline, one of the 20 conditions of DofE.

The assessed expedition on the Quantocks a few weeks later was hotter and happier. Every team was more prepared and experienced, due to route planning and team kit meetings, allowing everyone to pass and

experience the beauty of the hills.

In July, students will present to teachers and parents a review and reflection of their assessment as well as working on completing the remaining volunteering, physical and skills sections of the award.

We have all worked hard so far and reports are being written up by assessors. Everyone involved should be proud of completing this award.

Miss de Sousa said, "It is an absolute joy seeing the students in action during their interviews. Their level of professional blows me away every time!".




The Royal Airforce speaks to students about team work

Twelve-year-old journalists at WCSA organised an interview with Mr Penrose, MP for Weston-super-Mare. Mr. Penrose informed the reporters about his amazing plans to expand the M5 and reduce our carbon footprint.



Speaking to us from Westminster, he encouraged students who are interested in politics to "Dip their toes in the water".

When asked he said his biggest downfall was the recent resignation as the PM's anti-corruption Tsar, but he remarked that this was his choice, and encouraged people to stand on their own two feet.

He encouraged young people to be safe online, and informed them that even if they experienced negative comments, that they shouldn't let it get to them or influence their thoughts and feelings.

He recommended keeping in touch with nature to calm down, while simultaneously having a positive carbon impact. To calm the mind, he makes his impact through beekeeping. He assisted English Heritage to preserve its historic sites and make it what it is today.

Oliver, 12, from WCSA, organised the interview in the first place. He said, "Thank you to Mr Penrose. Our students felt privileged to be able to interview our MP."






























Uniform Matters

Thank you for your continued support in ensuring your child arrives in school wearing the correct uniform. As I'm constantly reminding students, uniform matters a great deal. In my recent assembly (Small Things Make a Big Difference), I extolled the virtues of wearing the WSCA uniform with pride...

- It creates a good impression
- It sets the tone
- It tells us you are ready to learn the same as being equipped, or being on time
- In the world of work, you will have to comply to a uniform or dress code – from serving fries in McDonalds, to teaching students in schools, there is a dress code

I went on to remind the students of the basics...

Our uniform policy states that students should be wearing;

- A WCSA blazer
- A WCSA tie
- · A white, collared school shirt
- Plain, black full-length tailored trousers. No jeans or leggings.
- Plain, black, tailored, knee length skirt. No elasticated tube skirts.
- Plain black, leather (or leather-look) polishable shoes, or plain black, leather (or leather look) polishable trainers. Canvas or suede shoes and trainers are not allowed. Laces must be black.



Please note that both styles of blazer (new or old logo) are still accepted.

Jewellery expectations...

- A maximum of two small stud earrings are allowed to be worn per ear. No hoops, no bars.
- One nose stud is permitted. No nose rings.
- All facial piercings are banned, including septum nose piercings.
- False, or acrylic nails are not allowed for practical reasons (affects your ability to write or type) and for health and safety reasons (practical subjects will be problematic)
- False eyelashes are not allowed

I highlighted the words in RED, because these are the most common issues that we, as a staff, deal with regarding uniform.

I finish by reminding the students that all schools have a Uniform Policy and that we had listened to the views of students and parents and amended our policy accordingly (we recently allowed plain black polishable trainers and a single nose stud).

Student Services have recently stocked up on all uniform items, from ties to shoes, and are always happy to equip students with said items as and when the need arises.
