We've also welcomed guest speakers from the University of Cambridge and the University of Sheffield, who have provided top tips on making competitive applications, as well as the NHS and mental health charities who support all our students with their physical and emotional wellbeing.

We have fifteen students in Year 12 applying to Oxford and Cambridge this year as well as many students applying to the Russell Group and Sutton Trust 30 universities: subjects range from the competitive Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Science and Law to Literature, Criminology, English Engineering, Psychology and History. Oxbridge Mathematics, applicants are participating in a prestigious MasterClass programme with the University of Cambridge which includes individual presentations on a super curricular topic of their choice and a free residential trip to Trinity Hall College Cambridge in the summer. We've also linked up this year with a non-profit organisation called the Brilliant Club whose Scholars Programme enhances the critical thinking and writing skills of our Year 12 Oxbridge applicants: students benefit from 6 tutorials with a PhD student and world expert before completing an undergraduate level assignment and visiting two leading UK universities.

Many of our Year 12 students continue to participate in MasterClass programmes with the University of Bristol and the University of Exeter and participate in a range of clubs and societies, such as the Human Evolution Society and the Law Society, and we're also delighted to announce that Taj Tarafdar is one of only 150 students in the UK to be selected for the prestigious US Summer School programme organised by the Sutton Trust! Meanwhile, Sam and Emily are preparing for the world of work by completing a 'Pathway to Flying Start' programme with multinational firm PwC.

We also welcomed some new members to the 6th Form family this year: we have three terrific students join us in Year 12 from Venice in Italy (Benedetta), Bremen in Germany (Janneke) and Zurich in Switzerland (Kayla): welcoming students from the continent, as well as from the Weston and Bridgwater areas, allows our students to form new friendships and to broaden their horizons. We also welcome a new member of staff to the team as Deputy Head of 6th Form, Mr Steve England: Mr England is an experienced A level Chemistry teacher and Head of STEM across the school. Mr England will help ensure all our students receive excellent pastoral support.

This featured Year 11 work from WCSA, PCSA and TKASA. The exhibition consisted of a wide range of artistic styles and creative talents which was greatly enjoyed by staff, parents and students. This was a great opportunity to show younger students what they can achieve with us in GCSE Art, as well as demonstrating our pride and students' achievements to the wider community.


Year 11 are sadly coming to the end of their GCSE course, currently working on their coursework portfolio due to complete around the Easter break. We are proud of the hard work and resilience these students have shown through challenging times and their commitment to their GCSE studies. I am excited to see what the future may hold for many of our students who

have ambitions for a career in the creative industry. Our GCSE Fine Art & Digital Art students have been full of ideas and concepts starting the year developing their work based upon the themes of 'Identity' and 'Anatomy'. Students have been enthusiastic when creating work in the style of artists and evolving their own ideas and themes. Students understand the importance of telling a story within their coursework, with many having created work beyond their years. Fine Art students have recently started their 'personalised project' using the skills learnt from project 1 to develop their ideas and concepts around their chosen theme. As a department we have been incredibly impressed by all the students' hard work and independence in developing their creative skills and processes.

In Year 7 we have covered a range of topics including


the artists Monet and Abby Diamond, experimenting with using watercolour and inks. Currently we are studying 'Dia De Los Muertos' which is the Mexican festival 'The Day of the dead'.

Year 8 have covered underwater through focusing on the artist Le Nahon along with looking at climate change and studying animals through the work of Mark Powell. Students have been developing their accuracy and detail alongside experimenting with ink, collage and biro drawing. Pop Art has recently been introduced to Year 8 who have been creating work influenced by the styles and characteristics of Pop Art based on their favourite celebrity.

In Year 9 we have been developing skills within photorealism through the theme of food and the work of work of Nancy Whitehead. Within this, students experimented with the grid method and using watercolour and acrylic paint, developing accuracy and the use of tone through colour. Students then progressed to learning portraiture and measurements of the face through the theme of 'Icons'. The urban arts festival of 'Upfest' has recently been introduced to Year 9 giving students the opportunity to develop their own concepts and ideas to communicate a message through their artwork.
















MUSIC




The Battle Of The Bands

DRAMA

An Update from Drama - from Mrs. Davies

This year has been particularly exciting for the Drama Department, after 18 months of classroom-based Drama (as a result of Covid 19 implications) we have returned to the studio! It has been awe inspiring to see the buzz of creation in the studios as students rehearse and work together. We have also been blown away by the resilience, confidence in performing and seeing the acting skills of all of our students again.



Year 7 are currently exploring the script The Terrible Fate of Humpty Dumpty. Students are reading the play scene by scene and then experiencing the process of casting, blocking, rehears-



ing and performing with a script.

Year 8 have just completed The Greatest Showman learning cycle in which they learnt about 4 very different styles of theatre. Students learnt about the context of the theatre practitioners, what influenced them and their work. Students then participated in workshops in the style of that showman, as they created their own view of what theatre should be. Students workshopped

theatre styles across the globe by investigating Stanislavski's naturalism, Brecht's epic theatre, Artaud's Theatre of Cruelty and Grotowski's poor theatre. Students then selected a style to create their assessments in and devised their piece from their own creativity. We had a

wondrous display of student imagination, including emotionally hitting scenes, explorations of current political issues, chair duets about celebrating our differences and haunting theatrical experiences.





Year 9 played through Commedia dell'arte, the comedy of the profession. This is a style of theatre that originated in 16th - 18th century Italy and heavily influenced pantomime. It explored spontaneous improvisation, stock characters and comic routines. Students investigated devising their own scenarios through stereotypical commedia characters and reinacted scenes from the play A Servant to Two Masters.

DRAMA



Year 10 BTEC Drama are working towards Component 1 of the course, where they are watching, analysing and acting scenes from the Broadway hit Hamilton. This historical musical written by Lin-Manuel Miranda tells the story of America's Founding Father, Alexander Hamilton. Students have been experiencing and learning more about the different roles in theatre.

Year 11 BTEC Drama are working towards the final unit of the course, Component 3, in which students create a piece of theatre that meets a brief set by the exam board. This is a culmination of all their skills they have learnt on the course and tests their knowledge, understanding, application of skills and evaluation. We are incredibly proud of their individual journeys throughout the course and cannot wait to see their final pieces.

WCSA Drama Club is an extra-curricular activity for students in Year 8 and 9. The purpose of the Drama Club is to teach performance skills alongside life skills to those pupils who have a keen interest in the performing arts. Our mission is to involve as many students as possible in celebrating all things theatre! Students explore different theatre roles and responsibilities, getting involved with acting, directing, choreography, lighting, sound, set, props and costume.

During this time, students have been building confidence by exploring different drama skills in different workshops each week. Each week, students

have been exploring a different scene, learning different routines, experiencing auditions for specific characters and solo parts. Students are currently working towards a showbiz showcase that will be performed at the school summer concert. The students will be performing musical numbers, including hit songs from Everyone's Talking About Jamie, Matilda and Grease. The students are incredibly talented and committed. We are incredibly proud of their efforts and cannot wait to see them perform!

The Drama Club runs on a Wednesday 3pm till 4pm in D01 with Mrs. Miller. If you are interested in joining the club please pop into Drama, we would be very happy to see you!


Fixtures


Pizza Club


Celebrating effort and achievement

HUMANITIES



Year 10 Geography GCSE fieldwork

As part of the Geography GCSE course students have to carry out their own fieldwork. During the summer term these students will be going on a fieldtrip to Bristol Harbourside to study the regeneration of this urban area and evaluate how successful it has been. Details of the visit will follow shortly.



KS3 Enrichment

The History Department are organising a Year 8 visit to the Black Country Museum (an open air living museum) on the 19th July

This will support and enrich students' learning of the Industrial Revolution

and how Britain helped shape our modern world which they studied in Learning Cycles 2 and 4. There will be an opportunity for students to experience a Victorian school maths lesson and tour an underground mine.

There will also be a Year 9 History trip to the Imperial War Museum, London on the 20th July. The Imperial War Museum is the world's leading museum of war and conflict. Founded while the First World War was still raging, it gives voice to the extraordinary people forced to live their lives in a world torn apart by conflict. As part of this visit we will visit the impressive First and Second World War galleries.







The Geography Department are organising a KS3 trip (Year 7-9) to the Eden Project in Cornwall on the 11th July. As part of this visit students will attend various workshops focusing on plant adaptions suitable for life in the rainforest and use ideas about evolution to explain the occurrence of these adaptations.





There are limited spaces available for all of these trips so we will be operating a 'first come first served' basis.

ICT AND BUSINESS STUDIES

PSHE

Year 9 PSHE Healthy Relationships Day - from Mrs. Venn



Our students live in a fast paced and ever changing world where there are lots of opportunities and few certainties. The rise of social media has changed how students view situations and events. Whilst being a tremendous force for good, social media can

also normalise more extreme behaviours. This is why we were delighted to offer all Year 9 students the opportunity to take part in an intensive two hour drama project. Working in partnership with Tender Education & Arts, students used drama and the creative arts to explore positive relationships and to develop the knowledge to prevent domestic violence and sexual abuse.

The session started with the group leaders sharing some startling statistics about the prevalence of domestic violence in the UK. Statements were read aloud and students had to move around the room and guess which statistic matched which fact. This led to some very insightful and interesting discussion work. Students (and some staff) were quite astonished to learn that 100 women and 20 men a year die as a result of domestic violence.

There was then some drama role-play work around subtle peer pressure and how to manage this. Students

really impressed the group leaders by their knowledge of how to identify examples of peer abuse and then they discussed how they could resolve the situation.

Finally, students worked collaboratively to place some key words on a chart across the room which ran from positive at one end to negative at the other. Examples of key words were things such as 'kindness', 'kicking',' kissing', 'cheating'. In nearly all groups, students classified 'cheating' as one of the worst crimes. This led to some in depth discussion about what constitutes a healthy and unhealthy relationship and group leaders explored which behaviours were 'legal' and 'illegal'. There was then a gradual movement of ideas as students came to realise that whilst cheating can have a devastating effect, it is in fact legal whereas abuse is most definitely illegal. Students left the session feeling empowered about how to identify abuse and make the right choices.

This workshop complements the extensive PSHE programme that WCSA has in place to develop the whole student and ensure all students leave school fully equipped to deal with all aspects of life. We will continue to offer events like these to supplement the more formal teaching of PSHE which takes place twice a week during PM tutor time and once a fortnight as a taught 55 minute lesson.

The Climate Justice Revolution Club and eco-council here at WCSA are excited to get started on their biodiversity area which will be full of insect attracting plants, insect hotels, bird and bat boxes and a vegetable garden. We already have a very beautiful rewilded area hidden away behind our sports courts - where there is a wide variety of wildlife, including badgers, foxes and hedgehogs. We have plans to plant trees and are looking into the possibility of having a beehive in these areas.

Other plans include working with the council to see how staff and students get to school, then finding ways to improve this. We are also in constant conversation with other schools around the UK (within a network called UKSSN - details found at www.transform-ourworld.org/ukssn) talking about what we can all do to help.

Our Eco-lead, Archie M, has recently won an award from the Mayor for his environmental work during
